Ngāti Kahungunu Mau Rakau/Whakawhanaungatanga Wangana

A small mau rakau group from the Wairarapa, led by Frank Te Maari McNally, will be hosted by Terese Mcleod on Matiu Somes Island 18th and 19th December, 2015. I think it's awesome to keep working and providing different ways for different people to connect to Matiu Somes Island, and I have always been conscious of the Iwi groups that were on the island before mine. After all, we have place names on the Island still in use today from their time, and their ancestors' bones are also here. The group of approximately 13 will be planning their groups for 2016 and doing some mau rakau work at different island locations.

The Pete and Pio Show on Matiu Somes Island

Comedy, Cooking and Conservation will be on the menu during the first week of January 2016 when the Pete and Pio presenters and film crew arrive on Matiu Somes Island.

The show features on Māori and Choice TV and will bring a crew of 8 to film this popular tourist and cooking show. The idea came about from long-time islander Terese Mcleod talking to her friend who is the show's researcher/writer Kirsty Babbington. The two developed the idea and producers accepted it.

The focus is showcasing the island in their upcoming series of visiting various small islands around New Zealand and exploring using produce that is available on Matiu Somes Island and from the harbour. Chef Pete will use some island lamb, island honey, go foraging for other island kai, and see what we find in the moana around the island.

Moving Home: Skink Translocation from the Island to Zealandia

A team from Zealandia have applied to move approximately 100 skinks from Matiu Somes Island to Zealandia in late January 2016. The Zealandia crew have already placed covers so the skinks start locating themselves and a team will start collecting them in January. Terese Mcleod from the island is working with Zealandia to get children's groups involved as an educational opportunity.

The Matiu Somes Island Quilt – Farewell gift to Jo Greenman

Terese and Ranger Emma worked tirelessly to create the Matiu Somes Island quilt as the main Matiu Somes Island community gift for Ranger Jo Greenman's farewell. It was presented to her on her official last day on the island during an island community lunch hosted by Terese, Ranger Emma and Fenella. Members from a cross-island community attended this informal lunch including members of the Eastbourne Forest Rangers, the Matiu Somes Island Charitable Trust, the East by West Ferry staff and other island stalwarts.

The quilt required a lot of work, Ranger Emma used island sheep wool and handmade the wool batting for the quilt fill, the image from Ranger Jo's favourite Island art work which was part of the Solander Art Gallery Matiu Somes Island exhibition several years ago got sign off from the artist and gallery. The image was professionally photographed in Wellington, requiring a secret operation to get the art work on/off the island without Jo noticing! The image was then sent to a fabric printer in Tawa to be printed onto material. The final stage was getting the Busy Bee Quilters to pull it all together.

Comings & Goings of the Fluttering Shearwaters

I have just returned from spending two nights on the island doing my monthly overnight visit. As I know birds like rough weather I extended my stay one night to catch 12/12/15's gales.

The results;

One very healthy chick in burrow 15. This is the same burrow (and parents) that raised one last year.

Birds are still sitting on an egg in burrow 16. This won't hatch now as it has been incubated way too long to be successful. All other eggs have been expelled from burrows.

A kakariki is nesting in burrow 76, and it has 6 eggs. On Friday night I caught 9 birds which is about the average now. They were all regulars.

Nine burrows are regularly being visited.

I found what appeared to be a natural shearwater burrow under the flax bushes to the west of the Wellington speaker.

It was a different story on Saturday night. Nadine (volunteer ranger) and I went to the colony in very blustery winds arriving just before 10pm. Birds were everywhere, calling from the ground, calling in the air, calling from behind the flax outside the shed door etc. We caught 27 different birds and there were others we couldn't get as they were on the inaccessible cliffs below the colony and others to the west of the colony.

The natural burrow was confirmed with a shearwater inside it.

Of the 27 birds, 5 were new 2012 chicks, 8 were new 2013 chicks and one was a 2013 Long Island non-transferred chick!!!

We have now had 14 2012 chicks return. The 2013 chicks were the first recorded as returning. The Long Island chick was not transferred from there as it was too big on transfer day.

The most birds previous caught in a single night was 14. Over the two nights 33 different shearwaters were caught and measured. Numbers are certainly building up. And it all looks very promising.

Thanks for your on-going support. Have a great Christmas, enjoy spending time with loved ones, and I hope you get a chance to relax.
